Imtiaz Sooliman of Gift of the Givers said their teams had been on site since the incident occurred and praised city firefight-ers for doing a magnificent job in controlling the fire and preventing a far greater disaster. He said they had the total co-operation of the MEC of human settlements in Gauteng and the City Dis-

aster Management. "Blankets and food wer handed out by our teams on Wednesday night. We have set up a facility from where all assistance will be facilitated in a controlled,

organised manner."
The organisation also provides two meals a day.

A tent has been provided to assist pupils who are writing exams.

Sooliman said the pub-lic's response had been overwhelming and the organi-sation was mobilising to accept and distribute dona-

The following items will be of value to the vic-tims: blankets, clothes, baby clothes, towels, linen, various food items, bottled water, baby milk powder, sanitary pads, disposable nappies, plastic utensils (plate, bowl, cup, spoon), bin bags and hygiene items. Building material will also be highly appreciated," said Sooliman

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TEPHINA Masebe lost everything in the fire that scorched the Msawawa informal settlement near Kya Sand in Randburg on Wed-

said that when she realised her shack was on fire. she went towards it, hoping to save something, anything, before the blaze destroyed all she owned. She felt the intense heat as she got closer and realised it was already too late. She decided to save herself instead.

She turned and ran

Masebe watched from a distance as flames engulfed her home. The fire reportedly started because of an unattended paraffin stove, and by the time firefighters managed to put out the inferno, an unprecedented level of damHelp pours in for informal settlement residents



age had been done.

"We've had fires in Msawe've had fires in Msa-wawa, but not this big," said spokeswoman for Johannes-burg Emergency Management Services, Nana Radebe. She estimated 200 shacks had been destroyed. Other reports went as high as 1 000.

The Department of Human

Settlements was still working on an official tally, but all could agree the area had never

seen a fire this bad. Though some of Masebe's neighbours carried the loss of their homes on their faces yesterday morning, she smiled broadly after she made her way through the Shoprite

mobile soup kitchen line. She held a cup of soup in one hand and several slices of bread in the other.

stroyed them.

She said she hadn't eaten since the fire, but even that fact didn't seem to bother her.

"I'm a survivor," she said. "I'm still alive, I'm happy." Her clothes and furniture.

she said, could be replaced. Masebe said her son Andrew didn't feel the same way. He's in Grade 12 and already had exams to worry about. Now his books and uniforms were gone. She said Andrew was overwhelmed by the situation. They stayed at a church up the road from Msawawa

on Wednesday. Yesterday, Andrew went to school while his mother sifted through the debris with her neighbours. Gift of the Givers, an

organisation that also pro-vided food for the victims, said it was working with the government and other non-profit organisations to set up a study centre for matrics.
The new MEC for Social

Development, Molebatsi Bopape, stopped by to thank organisations such as Gift of the Givers and EDS Projects for their quick response to the disaster.
